IV. Reading comprehension. (20%)

Passage A:

Venus Flytrap is one of nature's most intriguing plants. Found in Carolina, it is one of a few plants which rely on insects for nourishment, surviving on the nitrogen in animal amino acids. However, unlike other insectivorous plants, the Venus Flytrap catches its victims in dramatic fashion.

The stem of the plant branches into leaves several inches long, which are separated into two rounded lobes, each of which is lined with spikes. Each lobe contains three hairs, arranged in the shape of triangle. The lobes, during the waning hours of light, secrete a chemical whose reaction with sunlight creates a red glare, attracting insects. If an insect ventures inside a leaf and touches a hair, the lobes suddenly snap together. The spikes interlock to form a cage-like structure, imprisoning it. The lobes then steadily push together, crushing the insect. The plant also secretes a digestive juice which helps to dissolve its prey. The Venus Flytrap takes about ten days to digest an insect. When it is done, the leaf opens back up to wait for more prey.

Passage B:

Major holidays get a lot of attention, but minor holidays, like Boxing Day, shouldn't be overlooked. Boxing Day is a public holiday that is celebrated in the Commonwealth of Nations, which includes Australia, the UK, Canada, and others. It is a movable holiday which is observed on the first weekday after Christmas.

The origins of Boxing Day are not known for sure. One theory is that it started in England in the Middle Ages. Servants were required to work on Christmas Day, but were given the following day off. Before they left, employers would give servants boxes containing gifts and cash to take home to their families. Another theory is that December 26 is the day when church donation boxes were opened and their contents given to the poor.

Today, Boxing Day activities vary from country to country. In the UK, gifts are given to service workers like mail carriers and doormen. In South Africa, people give gifts to the less fortunate members of society, and call this holiday Day of Goodwill instead. Australians and Canadians celebrate Boxing Day by opening their wallets. In these countries, Boxing Day is a shopping holiday on which stores have post-Christmas clearance sales. The holiday benefits not only shoppers but shop owners as well, because it is usually the day of the year on which they make the most money. However, situations are sometimes out of control as shoppers can go to extremes to get good deals. Conflicts and injuries on this day are common and some people have even been accidentally killed.


